We planned a Poppy Walk on May 9^{th} for our 2^{nd} year to bring attention to the Poppy and our veterans. It was a cool day so we didn't have the turn out that we did last year. Plus we were competing with the Fargo marathon. But the individuals that joined us had a good time. The walkers do ½ mile laps around 2 blocks of where our Legion cabin sits. The walkers came close to last year's laps even if it was a little chilly and the wind blowing. We hook old poppies together to form a chain and use 1 poppy for each lap. We keep the chain on display at the cabin. Door prizes where distributed to the walkers.

We also had a silent auction with some nice items that were donated for the cause. We have a wall in the cabin that we use to "Honor Your Veteran". We make red paper poppies and sell them or \$1. The purchaser writes the name of the honored veteran on a paper poppy along with the branch of service and the war conflict they were in. We then put them on display on the "honor" wall until after Veterans Day. Our regular poppy distribution is also on display for anyone to make a contribution for a poppy.

We have grades 3 thru 6 make poppy posters for us.



For the selfless men and women whose final journey


home is in a country flag-draped coffin, on comrades' shoulders borne.

This past year, I have been National Security Chairman. First, I want to thank all who participated in the Round Table Discussions at the Mid-Winter Conference. I hope it was informative to all who attended—it surely was helpful to me as Chairman. I am still learning, and my year is just about over.

I know many units in North Dakota are located in small communities and live far from a military base, but I have been informed and I have informed many units that you can support the service personnel and their families from your small North Dakota unit. Every unit can participate in the coupon program—Google Overseas Coupon Program and you will find that you have many choices to work with. You may know a military person you can send coupons to, and they will distribute them to other military families. You can send cards and packages to military families or help a family in your community. If there is a military family in your community, you can assist a spouse in finding a job in the area. We can collaborate with The American Red Cross to assist military families in need. We can collaborate with Hiring Our Heroes Military Spouse eMentor Program by organizing hiring events or serving as a mentor. You can support Hiring Events for Veterans and Military and Veteran Spouses. You can participate in planning a Welcome Home event for separating servicemembers. The Federal Emergency Management Agency has developed a program to prepare citizens for emergency response. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program educates community members on disaster preparedness in their local communities. Training is offered on four topics: fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations. As you can see, the options are endless—we just need to be aware of what we can do in our community as the need arises.

Having given a few ideas and suggestions, you can expand from here. Please be aware that you can go to www.alaforveterans.org and find the Plan of Action for National Security. There are endless ideas, suggestions and much information regarding our military and their families. Sue Britton has been our National Security Chairman on the National Level this year. After the National Convention, you can find the new chairman's Plan of Action. We can always look for new ideas.

Cat Olson Seeks Re-election for Dept Secretary

Thank you to the Laverne J. Thompson Unit 11 in Cavalier who has endorsed my candidacy for Department Secretary. I am eligible for membership thanks to my father Neil who is a Vietnam Vet. I am eager to run for the office of Department Secretary for a third term. I feel there are more ways that I can serve the department and help us grow. My decision to run for a another term is strongly tied to a resolution being brought before Department Convention this year, regarding the hiring of an office employee and continued election of the Department Secretary.

In the last two years, I've had the opportunity to interact with unit leaders and hear what challenges they are facing and successes they are celebrating. I've also been able to exchange ideas with other departments and learn about what does and does not work for them, and reflect on how some of those things may also benefit our own department. When I first took office I thought the office of Department Secretary was primarily a clerical position, but have come to see how much more this office can and should do.

The American Legion Auxiliary is ultimately a corporation, and based on conversations with long-standing Auxiliary members I don't think being a corporation is something we've had to focus on. With the way business is changing (especially IRS regulations) I feel it is increasingly important that our department leaders understand our role as a corporation and how it impacts units and members.

Last year the national office released the "Department Operations Guide" which is an excellent resource on a wide variety of topics. The guide may be downloaded from the national website. I really like how it explains the various roles of officers and committees in the Auxiliary. The role of department secretary is certainly addressed. Ultimately she is the secretary of the corporation. She is also an office manager. In our department, we have given her the third duty of taking care of daily clerical duties. By being the main (and often only) office employee, we lose the oversight role. And because the secretary is so busy with clerical duties, it makes finding time to tend to the all corporation tasks difficult, let alone find time to help the department grow in areas we need to develop in order to continue existence.

While in office I took on the additional duties of compiling and editing the Message, designing and continuously updating our website, branding our department by consistent use of our logo on documents, and have worked to create as many checklists and handouts as possible to educate officers and members at all levels. The use of Facebook and establishment of four different email

subscription lists have been developed for those who prefer those means of communication. In response to members saying they are missing out on valuable information sent in unit mailings, we've added unit mailings to our website and started sending some information directly to the officer that needs it most. I am proud of what has been accomplished!

Finding one person to complete all these duties is a daunting task; it's a large skill set to expect from one person. Pair that with the salary we have available and it makes finding the right secretary for our department even more of a challenge.

The proposed resolution splits the Department Secretary position as we know it now into two positions: a hired office employee who would take care of the daily clerical work, and an elected department secretary who provides oversight to the department office and guidance to DEC and officers. The hired office employee may not be the expert on the ins/outs and history of the Auxiliary, but she should have strong computer and customer service skills. This position would be paid a salary. The Department Secretary would remain an elected position who is the secretary of the corporation and makes sure that needs and directives of the Department Executive Committee are carried out. She would also provide resources and guidance to the Department President so that she may in turn effectively help her chairmen, units and members. We know the Department President will change each year, and ideally the Department Secretary would remain in office several years, providing continuity to department

If the position was split in this way, I feel it will expand the pool of qualified Department Secretary candidates. A member who has a strong knowledge of the Auxiliary and how to run a corporation may not be interested in "the daily grind" of office work. By putting the responsibility of daily office work into the hands of a hired office employee, a qualified person may be more likely to run for Secretary. Assuming that the department secretary only receives expenses for travel and meetings (similar to the Chaplain and Historian), the department essentially gets a "buy one get one" deal on the department office workforce.

I ask that you seriously consider the proposed resolution, and if you have any questions to contact me or any of the resolution authors. Depending on the outcome of the resolution, I ask for your vote as Department Secretary and the Convention on June


