In today's social media, we have become accustomed to a term called "canceling." It is a way of expressing disapproval of something or someone in a public forum. People cancel others when they want to stop the spread of objectionable ideas, but those who have been



canceled see it as their right to free speech being suppressed.

We can appoint ourselves arbiters of right and wrong and judge and jury. And now, thanks to social media, we get to dole out punishment.

Aunt Jemima was canceled. They had to rethink how they promoted their product to an increasingly enlightened and more modern audience. Dr. Seuss had to pull six books because of racist and insensitive imagery. Colin Kaepernick's kneeling during the National Anthem was seen as disrespecting the American flag and the military. Canceling is a practice of groups on both sides of the political spectrum who want to promote their own ideology and silence their opponents.

Followers of Christ have always faced pressure from those who disapprove of certain aspects of the gospel message. People tried "canceling' them - from the biblical stoning of Stephen to present day massacres in African villages.

The Apostle Paul tried combating the cancel culture at the Corinthian church (1 Corinthians Chapter 15) by starting with their belief that there is no bodily resurrection and then explained what it would mean if that was actually true. He used 'if. . . . then" statements to show that "if" the bodily resurrection of Jesus is canceled, "then" our hope of the gospel is gone and useless and we are "still in our sins."

Paul's reasoning may be a good pattern for us to follow when challenged by differing views or opinions. There may be unpopular aspects of the gospel message that we may feel pressured to suppress, but does that removal distort the message? And to what gain?

During our upcoming Convention in June, we will be discussing changes and/or additions to our Department Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules. I am asking everyone to be in prayer for these meetings. Rather than choosing sides and trying to cancel each other, let us objectively look at the proposals being presented. Let us see how we can try to clarify these documents to make our organization the best it can be and one in which everyone is proud to belong.

Bees hide a surprising secret. When a hive loses its queen—the only one capable of giving life to the colony and maintaining order in a perfectly organized society-all seems lost. Life in the hive slows down. Without new eggs, the future disappears. Within a few weeks, the colony is threatened with extinction. But bees don't panic. Nor do they wait for salvation from outside.

With an extraordinary display of collective intelligence and deep instinct, they launch a spectacular emergency response that is hard to imagine in a world ruled by insects. Transformation begins with a simple but essential choice. Worker bees select some ordinary larvae-the very ones that would normally become ordinary workers. They are nothing special. They were born no different. But now their fate changes completely.

They are selected to receive a special diet: royal food. A rare substance produced by nutritious bees, rich in protein, vitamins, and bioactive compounds. It's royal food in the purest sense. The larva fed exclusively on this substance no longer follows the usual path. In just a few days, its body develops differently. The body becomes larger, stronger. Life expectancy is multiplied by almost twenty. It won't work. It will rule. It will not follow routine. It will bring life. The queen isn't chosen based on genes. It's created.

What makes this process truly fascinating is that the worker bee is the king. It's as if, in a human society, you could take an ordinary child and, with the right nutrition, the right environment, and the necessary support, turn it into an extraordinary leader. Without genetic interventions. Without fireworks. Just thanks to support and perspective

A leader is born out of crisis. This metamorphosis doesn't just save the larva. It saves the entire colony. Once the new queen is ready, she takes over the hive, begins laying eggs, restores

order, and begins a new collective life cycle. From the threat of extinction, the colony is reborn stronger, more organized, and more balanced.

A silent but profound lesson. Bees show us without words that in moments of great crisis, what is needed is not despair-but clarity. The right choice. Care and guidance. In their world, no queen is born. It is nurtured & guided.

And perhaps, just as in the beehive, in life too, it doesn't matter who you are at the beginning, it's the end result that counts. But rather than what you receive, how you are cared for, and what decisions others make in difficult times. Because sometimes the strongest leaders are born in the most difficult moments.



Gackle Area Units Honor Veterans and Members

The American Legion Posts and Auxiliary Units of Gackle, Streeter and Fredonia and the American Legion Post of Kulm co-hosted the 106th American Legion Birthday Party / Vietnam War Veterans Day event at the Gackle Legion Hall on Saturday, March 29, 2025. Approximately 100 people attended. A light meal was served, followed by a program.

Gackle Legion Post #250 Commander Jon Metz welcomed everyone to the event and led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance. Randy Entzminger, Gackle Legion member and guest speaker, shared an informative presentation titled "The History of the Gackle American Legion Memorial Hall." His discourse included names and pictures of the founding members of the Gackle Legion and Auxiliary, and pictures of the building progress during construction of the Legion Hall.

The Saturday event was highlighted by the presentation of North Dakota "Welcome Home" coins to sixteen veterans who served between 1959 and 1975. The coin has a circle of 238 dots representing the known ND lives lost during the Vietnam War. 10 panels of the Vietnam Wall represent the remaining unrecovered ND MIA. The audience gave a standing ovation to thank these veterans and provide the recognition they did not receive when they first came home.
